Canada is ready to be a global leader in agriculture and agri-food production, however, climate change and an increasingly competitive global market for agricultural innovations are disrupting the sector. The nation's small to medium-sized enterprises (SMEs) are faced with acute challenges in product and market development, access to expertise and limited R&D opportunities. If businesses are to meet the demands for increased productivity and long-term sustainability, a "made in Canada" capacity to innovate is needed. Simon Fraser University (SFU) through the B.C. Centre for Agritech Innovation (BCCAI) leads a \$27.5 million investment from industry, the Province of British Columbia and Pacific Economic Development Canada. BCCAI supports SMEs using SFU's circle innovation to bring their products to market faster. The model is designed to plug in SMEs to the right support, at the right time bringing together ecosystem expertise to help companies develop and de-risk new technologies. Learn how the Centre is working with SMEs to accelerate innovation to improve food security in BC's agritech sector.
